About the trip:

Alternative Spring Break (ASB) trip is the longest running service-immersion program at Canisius. Campus Ministry has offered this unique alternative to a traditional spring break for 21 years. In the spring of 2011, 39 Canisius students and staff members traveled to sites in rural Appalachia located in Kentucky and West Virginia. Groups also traveled to the Benedictine Community in Erie, PA and to Harpers Ferry in Knoxville, MD.

This year, ASB participants will be traveling throughout Appalachia to spend one week doing a variety of service work including home repair and construction, tutoring, working with the elderly, and trail construction. Read the attached site description form to get a better idea of what individual sites will offer for service and accommodations.

ASB is based on four cornerstones: solidarity, simplicity, spirituality, and social justice. ASB participants will go through a variety of pre and post—trip meetings to learn more about the regions in which they will be working. On-site accommodations and food will be simple. Reflection and prayer will be part of the daily routine during the preparation process and trip.

Criteria for acceptance:

- Commitment to the four trip cornerstones: solidarity, social justice, spirituality, and simplicity.
- Participation in all preparatory meetings as listed below.
- Students going on an international service-immersion trip and who are interested in attending ASB, will need to schedule a meeting with Lu Firestone and Sarah Signorino to discuss the practicality of participating in both trips.

Trip cost:

- Each participant is responsible for securing a total of \$200 or \$300 (depending on site location).
- Participants will participate in a variety of fundraising activities such as letter writing, t-shirt sale, and pancake breakfast.

- Wednesday, December 7th: Applicants are notified of their acceptance.

- Friday, March 2nd: All money is due by 5pm to Campus Ministry.

Alternative Spring Break 2012 Site Descriptions

GLENMARY FARM, Vanceburg, KY

Glenmary Farm is a retreat-like service immersion program which offers an opportunity to serve Lewis County Kentucky, a very poor county located about two hours from Cincinnati, Ohio. This is done by building houses for those of low income, working with the elderly, working with the mentally and physically handicapped, working at a local food pantry, and other odd jobs in the community. Glenmary Farm will expose local culture by going to a multitude of different cultural sites, such as a bluegrass\country concert, local speakers on the problems facing people in Appalachia, a local church service, and a picnic for local kids. Every day will finish with a reflection guided mostly by the volunteers.

NAZARETH FARM, Salem, WV

Nazareth Farm offers a service-retreat experience centered around 4 cornerstones: Simplicity, Prayer, Service, and Community. During a week here, time will be spent learning home repair skills while serving the people of Doddridge County, West Virginia, take a hike up our beautiful mountain, grow in community with other students from across the country, grow spiritually, give time to serving the farm by working in the gardens or kitchen, and learn about Catholic social teaching.

NATIONAL PARKS SERVICE AT HARPER'S FERRY, Knoxville, MD

Harpers Ferry is located by the Potomac and Shenandoah rivers in the states of West Virginia, Maryland and Virginia. The participants will be staying in a historic volunteer house and working for the National Parks Service in Harpers Ferry. While here, they will have the opportunity to learn more about the National Parks Service and the history behind Harpers Ferry. The service focuses on heavy labor for park upkeep and renovations. Projects will include landscape restoration, which would include, but not limited to; modern fence removal, historic fence construction, trail maintenance, brush clearing, trash/illegal dumping pick-ups, etc. This year Canisius will be working with Boston University's ASB participants at the site.

LANTZ FARM/COAL TOUR, New Martinsville, WV

The Coalfields Service Immersion provides opportunities for us to engage and interact with the community members in the coalfield regions of Appalachia. At Lantz Farm, participants will work with the community partners to provide services such as working with soup kitchens, senior centers, local schools and housing rehab programs. The Coalfield regions of Appalachia are rich in a culture and history unlike other regions. Participants will be able to strive to understand and examine the causes and potential solutions to the problems facing these communities. By getting this experience they will be able to return to their own communities and educate others to help build stronger and healthier communities in Appalachia and all regions facing these same economic and humanitarian issues.

APPALACHIAN CATHOLIC WORKER, Spencer, WV

The Appalachian Catholic Worker's service program has a threefold approach for us to experience Catholic social teaching first hand. Time will be divided equally among 1) service projects on the farm and within the local community 2) education on social and environmental justice issues relevant to Appalachia, and 3) daily discussion and reflections on your experiences. Projects require a lot of hands, but not a lot of skill, like chopping, hauling, stacking wood, raking gravel, painting, clearing trash and visiting with the elderly. Education will include a field trip to Coal Country to learn about mountaintop removal and the history of coal mining. Discussions and Reflections will combine social analysis, critical thinking and prayer to integrate what you've experienced in order to go home and continue serving those in need in your own area.
